Dear Mother

Yesterday was our second day in Fiume as it was a Sunday there was nothing to interest us very much in the town so we went for a long walk up the hills at the back of the town so as to get a good view out over the Adriatic, then we followed a road leading south & came to the frontier between Italy & Yugo Slavia, a river runs between, & on the bridge are the soldiers of each country; they examine the papers of all the people who pass to & fro. we did not attempt to pass, although we had our passports indorsed for Yugo Slavia because we had been told we should have to get special papers signed in Fiume & as there was nothing special to go for we did not bother, but it was rather fun seeing all the people & cars being held up.

In the evening the Captain entertained us with the gramophone until we got under way at 10 o'clock. he also made some most surprising remarks - at least they are surprising

To English ears. I suppose the French & Italians are used to them, it makes conversation rather difficult, one doesn't quite know what to say next & subjects are very limited, & we dare not catch each other's eyes for fear of laughing. However we do have a good laugh afterwards when we are alone.

We have very good food here, the stewardess brings our breakfast to our cabins, it is just coffee, rolls, butter, jam & an orange. Lunch is at 12 o'clock. To-day we had hors d'oeuvre soup, risotto. (savory rice) fried liver & peas. roast pork & beans, cream puffs, fruit & coffee. For dinner we have soup, fish, roast, poultry, a vegetable as separate course, sweet, cheese fruit & coffee.

This morning when I came on deck I was surprised to see we had a cargo of cows & bulls. They seem quite contented, they are bedded down with lots of straw on the lower deck & there is a man in charge to feed & water them

as the sea is perfectly calm they are quite as well off as in their own sheds. We did not see them come on board, but the Captain told us they were put on with the crane with a broad belt round their middles, poor cows, they must have been surprised, they are going to Brindisi, we shall arrive there tomorrow afternoon, we shall not be there many hours, but we stay a day & a half in Athens as the ship takes on coal there,

We had the most glorious sunset this evening. The sea was like one enormous flashing opal. we stood & watched it until it faded.

I expect to post this at either Bari or Brindisi, & I hope to send another letter from Athens, but we may have difficulty in getting stamps there, so do not be surprised if this is the last letter before I get to Egypt

Amice is feeling a lot better & I am very fit.
