Dec 20th 1935.

Dear Mother.

I am sorry my letters seem to have gone astray, one is accounted for, as I had fallen down flat at the bottom of the post-box but there should have been 8 letters from Luc written during November & I just after my arrival in October & this is the sixth I have written during December. The only thing I have asked for was the pencils & that letter must have reached you safely as the pencils arrived Luc very promptly. I expect the mails are rather disorganised owing to the Italian bothers.

Sardic arrived back from Cairo today he said Otto was settled in hospital & getting on all right, they say his wrist should heal very well, but they are afraid the foot may be a bit stiff ^{permanently} as a result from the fracture. The ambulance was waiting at Cairo station

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so there was no delay in getting him to the hospital, but by Sardic's account he had a very bad time during the journey. I am afraid it is going to be a long & expensive business. I am wondering if the Society is liable in this case, as he had no right to be walking about on the walls like that, I am afraid it means a lot of worry for poor Amice, & I do not know what the outcome will be. The men were dreadfully upset poor little Mahmud had to be restrained as he wanted to show his sympathy by stroking Otto Amice will be back Sunday or Monday & I hope my next letter will contain more cheerful news. I hope you received the one before this as it was a long one describing the accident. Nannie asks me to send her Greetings to you both. I hope Father's cold is better. Tell him not to go galivanting in bad weather, or I shall have to come home to look after him.
