

Cairo. May 2nd [1934]

Dear Mother.

Another thrill. - I have added still another mode of conveyance to my list. I have had my first flight. Yesterday. Professor Oliver took Amice & I by aeroplane^{sic} from Heliopolis to Alexandria & from there by car to Burg el Arab where he is having a house built in the Bedawin fortress, he retires this summer & is going to devote his time to studying the plant life that survives out in the desert there

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the hour as the wind was with us
but there were no clouds so we did
not ascend so high. I cannot tell
you how much I enjoyed it. we
flew over the delta, then over the
desert, & over the salt lakes that
are on the fringe of the coast.

Then coming back by evening we
saw all the lights of Cairo below
us. the landing was very exciting.
We had a glorious time at Burg el Arab.
we went to lunch with Bramley Bey.
He is rather a famous person here.
He did a lot of work towards reorganising
the Bedawin tribes who got scattered
during the war, he has rebuilt the
old Arab fortress in the medieval style
& set up a court of justice there, found
markets for their wool & various industries
etc. His house is like a crusaders castle

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with a great coat of arms painted on
 the outer gate, I shall have to try
 to describe it to you on my return
 as I find it impossible to write it
 all. I am feeling very tired. We
 were up at five yesterday, & did
 not get to bed until nearly midnight,
 & today I have been busy fixing up
 things in Cairo. I find my boat
 leaves Friday 4th instead of the 5th
 which does not leave much time.
 I am with Nancy now. she is
 better than she was but not as
 strong as she hoped to be.
 she will be leaving Cairo about May
 22nd.
 I got your letter from books to-day
 you had timed it perfectly.
 Too weary to write any more now.
 Nancy joins me in love to you both
 Your affectionate daughter
