## ON BOARD S.S. Largs Bay 31 ${ }^{\text {st }}$ Jan 1929.

Dear Mother.
Yesterday we were at Malta, we did not stay long enough for passengers to go ashore, but we were right inside the harbour \& could get a good view of Valetta it is a white stone town. all flat roofs \& very beautiful seen from the sea with the sun shining on it.

Lots of Maltese boys came aboard with oranges \& all sorts of lace goods. I bought 3 oranges. They were fresh picked with the leaves on the stalk \& so sweet \& juicy. we left by 9 o'clock \& I spent a lazy morning on deck reading. two aeroplanes accompanied us until Malta was out of sight. they flew round \& round the ship waving to us, it was great fun.

The afternoon was cold \& wet, the changes in tempera -ture are terrific. Uncle Jim has caught a bad cold. I have insisted on him seeing the ships doctor he didn't want to go for only a cold. but as he feels sneezy \& generally runny I think he ought to have some -thing to check it in time. so he is going at 9.30 this morning.

I hear we can not reach Port Said until

early Saturday morning. This is a very akward ${ }^{\text {sic }}$ time
for us. as it lands us in Cairo after banks \& Cooks
<are> closed. \& the next day is Sunday when <all> European offices are closed. so I shall try to get to Cooks office in Port Said on the way to the station to get some $<$ more $>$ Egyptian money to carry on with. There will be lots of shops open Saturday evening \& Sunday in Cairo so once I get a supply of funds we shall be allright ${ }^{\text {sic }}$, isn't it funny I got landed in Cairo on a Sunday last year. Uncle J has $£ 6$ in Egyptian \& I have $£ 4$. so we should'nt ${ }^{\text {sic }}$ be stranded in any case.

I have got to go to the purser's office with my passport this morning. I am also due at the barbers shop for a hair cut.

On board S.S. Largs Bay Jan 3 Feb $1^{\text {st }} 1929$.

Have just heard we are to be landed at Port Said at $120^{\prime} \mathrm{el}$ 12 o'clock tonight. we shall probably have to go to the Marine Hotel, as I dont ${ }^{\text {sic }}$ think there is a train before 8 o'clock in the morning, our delay in starting has put us exactly 12 hours late. $\&$ we lost the time we had made up at Malta. we reached there at 2 in the morning but had to wait outside the harbour for daylight before we were allowed to enter Since leaving Malta there has been a strong NE wind \& it has been bitterly cold. as cold as off the English coast. I don't wonder they have had a flu epidemic in these parts.

Uncle Jimmie's cold is a little better the Doctor gave him some medicine which has eased the $\mathrm{c} a /<_{0}>$ ugh, but his nose is very troublesome. my cold has'nt ${ }^{\text {sic }}$ entirely gone, I still need a lot of hankies. I had a washing day yesterday \& dried them in my cabin so I shall not have to repack dirty ones


I shall be glad when we reach our destination now, there is not much enjoyment on board in this wind all the sheltered spots are crowded out.

Just finished a very amusing book "Jonah \& Co" by Dornford Yates. it is about a party of 6 people touring France \& Spain in two small cars. "Ping" \& "Pong" respectively, their adventures with officials are well wert [h] worth reading I think you would enjoy it.

There does not seem much news this time will tell you our further adventures when I reach Cairo.
