



S.S. CALIFORNIA

Saturday.

Dear Mother.

We did not see much of Gibraltar this morning, we arrived before 7 & were away by 8.30. & it was pouring with rain & everything obscured with mist, since it has cleared & has been quite fine but cloudy.

This afternoon the crew had a boat drill, there was a lot of bugle blowing & creaking of ropes, & the boats were let down on a level with A. deck & then drawn up & put in their places on the boat deck. it caused a little mild excitement.

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from Marseilles.

I think quite a lot of people were ill the first three days, for I seem to see so many strange faces about the deck, (accompanied by the usual sets of arms legs, bodies etc). There will be quite a number of passengers come aboard at Marseilles.

To-day at ^{lunch} ~~dinner~~ we were given a ships newspaper. wireless news of course, I am cutting out two items that may interest you.

I hope Father has had nice fine weather for his garden work, it will be very exciting when the building begins, I have not been able to think of any more gadgets for the garage.

I am afraid this is a very short letter, there is so little news, I expect after Marseilles there will be a Sports Committee & some sort of entertainment programme got up, at present there is only the orchestra, piano, violin, & cello, they play at meal time & for

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a little while in the lounge this in the morning. Several people have bought gramophones that they play on deck. it is rather disconcerting if one happens to be just between two playing different records at once!

There has been a notice put up that no gramophones or musical instruments are to be played between 2 & 4, so I suppose some one's afternoon nap has been disturbed.

I hope there will be more to tell you in my next letter, I will be able to post another on board at Port Said.
