of French peasants, & a whole village scene, with little houses. & people looking out of the windows, windmills bridges over streams. herds of goats etc. <all pottery.>. They were very amusing. we also saw pictures, a few very good modern ones & lots of the usual thing by the yard. also casts of statues. some of Rodin's. etc. we might have seen more, but it was closing time at 4 o'clock. so we made our way out into the gardens again & visited a small zoo. Then we had tea & cakes. & after that another tram ride; we had been told of a circular route that went along by the sea past a famous bathing place at Courniche^{sic}, (spelling is guesswork) so we made our way to a certain side street where they sell flowers & got on the tram & had a glorious ride right out of the town along the bay, we could see the lighthouse & the Chateau d'If. & all the little islands, the rocks are white & the sea a most vivid blue. almost purple. not a bit green like the Atlantic, we returned inland & got down at the point we started from. the ride took an hour. & our two fares came to something less than $\frac{2}{5}$ francs. so it was not very extravagant. our tram back to the docks cost us 60 centimes each & we arrived back on board soon after 7 o'clock just in time to dress for dinner.

This concludes my adventures up to date I expect I shall have something more to tell you when before I post this at Malta. I am just going to the upper deck to look at the lights of Marseilles before I turn ın.
